Dear Friends

'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' (John 6.8)

What could such a little amount contribute to feed so many people? One small packed lunch would not arouse much hope. But the disciples did not understand what Jesus was about to do. We do not always appreciate what can happen as a result of the immeasurable nature of divine grace.

There is much happening in this well-known story which appears in all four Gospels. At the heart of the story lay essential truths of which we need to be constantly reminded, not least at a time when the divide between those who have much and those who have very little is an ever-widening gulf; not least when we fail to grasp what God can still do in the most challenging of circumstances. Is this story not reminding us that when human endeavour and divine grace meet, the situation changes beyond our expectations? Gifts that are brought in love are not only accepted, but multiplied. Those who obey the command to sit and trust are not sent away empty. God's bountiful resources are not simply adequate, but overflowing, leaving more to be gathered up than was there at the beginning.

Finally, in this story we can see in the actions of Jesus with the food a figure of what is done at the Eucharist. When we come to the altar, when bread and wine are taken, and given that we may receive the very life of Jesus, we remember with thanksgiving – which goes beyond any words – the greatness of his love for us. *With love and blessings*

Interestingly, the last Bishop "produced" by St Michael's (rather than the Parish) was Bishop Gordon Roe who was priest-in-charge at St Michael's in the 1960s. He studied for ordination at St Stephen's House, then after a curacy in Bournemouth came to St Michael's and was then appointed Vice Principal of St Chad's College Durham. After that he became a vicar in Durham before being consecrated Bishop of Huntingdon in 1980. Not a dissimilar trajectory to Fr Joe! The second interesting connection is that Bishop Gordon died on 19 July 1999, 25 years to the day before Fr Joe's consecration.

A typical food parcel might contain: cereal, soup, pasta, rice, tinned tomatoes/pasta sauce, lentils, beans and pulses, tinned meat, tinned vegetables, tea/coffee, tinned fruit, biscuits, UHT milk, fruit juice. Also toiletries, nappies and household cleaning items. Food can be placed in the collection box in church or taken to either Preston Road Food Bank or Christ Church Food Bank. Worship

<u>This Week</u> The celebrant and preacher on 28 July will be The Revd Dr Charles Miller. At the time of writing, the clergy rota beyond 28 July had not been published, but on Sunday 4 August Fr Paul will preside and preach.

Commemorations this week include Monday: Mary, Martha and Lazarus, companions of Our Lord; Tuesday: William Wilberforce, social reformer, Olaudah Equiano and Thomas Clarkson, anti-slavery campaigners, 1833, 1797 and 1846; Wednesday: Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus, 1556.

<u>William Wilberforce</u> From a speech delivered to the House of Commons in May 1789 on the total abolition of slavery:

"Sir, the nature and all the circumstances of this trade are now laid upon us. We can no longer plead ignorance. We cannot evade it. We may spurn it. We may pick it out of the way. But we cannot turn aside so as to avoid seeing it. For it is brought now so directly before our eyes that this House must decide, and must justify to all the world and to its own conscience, the rectitude of all the grounds of its decision."

The Clewer Initiative The Clewer Initiative is the national work of the Church of England to combat modern slavery. Beginning initially in 2016 as a three year project, funding is now in place from the Clewer Sisters to continue until

2030. The Clewer Sisters, the Order of St John the Baptist, moved to Ripon Theological College in Cuddesdon in 2012 and the two remaining sisters are now cared for by the Sisters of St Margaret at their nursing home in Chiswick. The Sisters were able to provide the new chapel at Ripon College as well as Harriet Monsell House (named after the foundress of the community).
