## We welcome Fr AKMA to preside and preach at Mass today

Dear Friends

### ‘My sheep hear my voice, I know them, and they follow me’ (John 10.27)

This Sunday used to be known more widely as Good Shepherd Sunday. I wonder what you call to mind primarily when you think about sheep. I think of them as both innocent and harmless animals, but also rather troublesome due to their waywardness and tendency to wander off and get lost.

There is something of the ‘sheep syndrome’ in us all which perhaps is why we project these faults onto them. We too can follow in the wrong way, leading to intolerance and lack of love for neighbour. Or we follow in the right way which brings the fruits of peace and unity within the family of God which all humanity needs. In ancient times the shepherd did not drive his flock but led it, as in the promise that God ‘shall feed his flock like a shepherd: and gather the lambs with his arm, and carry them in his bosom, and shall gently lead those that are with young’ (Isaiah 40.11) The loving shepherd does not only lead those who willingly follow him. He seeks the lost one and carries it back on his shoulder (Luke 15.5). Jesus is the Good Shepherd who leads his people because he has gone before us on the same road, knowing its perils, trials, anguish, even through the valley of the shadow of death. The Good Shepherd is also the Passover Lamb who has been sacrificed for us. As we live his Risen life this Eastertide let us indeed continue to ‘celebrate the feast Alleluia!’ (cf the Eastertide Invitation to Communion).

**ABINGDON FOODBANK** The St Nicolas’ Church pew slip also has an item about the Abingdon Foodbank: “Foodbank: at the moment the foodbank needs tinned mince, tinned sardines, cooking oil, pasta sauce and corned beef. Also cleaning sponges, shampoo and strong carrier bags. In March, Abingdon Foodbank distributed 229 food parcels to people facing hardship in Abingdon and the surrounding villages. These parcels fed 559 people, of which 243 were children.” There is a foodbank collection point in St Michaels’ and there are also collection points in local supermarkets, see

## Worship

**May** The celebrants and preachers in May are: 11 May Fr AKMA, 18 May Fr Paul/ The Revd Dr Jennifer Brown, 25 May The Revd Elizabeth Birch.

Wednesday 14 May is the festival of Matthias the Apostle and there are two commemorations in the calendar this week: Monday 12 May: Gregory Dix, priest, monk, scholar, 1952 and Friday 16 May: Caroline Chisholm, social reformer, 1877.

**Gregory Dix** George Dix was born in London in 1901, educated at Westminster School and Merton College Oxford before attending Wells Theological College prior to ordination. For a short time he was a tutor and lecturer in modern history at Keeble College before being clothed as a novice the Anglican Benedictine Community at the Abbey in Pershore, where he took the name Gregory. This was shortly before the Community moved to Nashdom Abbey in Burnham, Berkshire. Based in Nashdom he found time for writing and research. He is perhaps best known for his major work, *The Shape of the Liturgy*, first published in 1945 and still in print today. He died on 12 May 1952.

This passage is taken from a sermon preached by Dom Gregory at the Patronal Festival of St Mary's Church, Paddington on 8 July 1945, not long after VE Day. The full sermon can be found in *The Sacramental Life, Gregory Dix and his Writings*, edited by Simon Jones (2007).

I think one of the real difficulties of leading the life of a Catholic Christian in our day is the great difficulty of relating our religious life in any very satisfying way to the surge and sweep of the mighty events which are passing daily before our eyes. ... It happened by chance that on Friday afternoon I listened in to the hoisting of the Union Jack over Berlin. ... We in this island may have dreamed of it occasionally, but how fantastic such an idea seemed to us at the time. And now it has happened – and we have scarcely even take note of it or been stirred by it.

... We look out today on a world today that writhes in the agony of spirit that is the consequence of our own alienation from God – and yet does not repent, a disenchanted world that scarcely dares to think of the present and only hope without much expectation for a peace which it fears will mean a turmoil only less tremendous than its war.

... But even this world is still *God's* world. He is still at work in it ... no word from God shall ever be void of power. ... All things hang for the world upon the faithfulness of the Church to this truth. We are men who have seen most clearly that the world is *God's*, and *therefore* that men and women matter literally *infinitely* more than any *human* institutions. We have tried to act drastically and thoroughly upon that clear knowledge, to live our whole life upon it – because it is the ultimate bed-rock fact about human living.

... Every action in which *I* am faithful – the little *I* – the individual man – so dear to God – every faithfulness of mine has its own eternal consequence, and also its *theological* significance for the Church and world in history, just because of my relation to Jesus. God is not only the Judge of the Nations and the Lord of History. He is the sovereign Lord and Redeemer of my individual soul, the guide of my individual life, who treasures and uses every action in it that I will give him. He is the joy and the reward, just because He is the source and end of the human being that I am.

strengthen us to be faithful to our calling,  
raise up a faithful shepherd and pastor  
to serve among us in this parish,  
and grant that,  
together with the one you choose and call,  
we may together proclaim the good news  
with courage and joy.  
In the name of Christ, we pray, **Amen.**

It is also a Season of Vacancy with respect to the appointment of a new Archbishop of Canterbury. A prayer for the appointment of a new Archbishop from the web page for the Crown Nominations Commission process:

Heavenly Father, shepherd of your Church,  
send us a faithful pastor to lead with wisdom, courage, and love,  
proclaiming your Gospel, celebrating the sacraments,  
and guiding your people in unity and truth.  
Strengthen your Church, we pray, and direct us in your ways; through Jesus Christ our Lord.  
Amen.

Just at the point of distributing this pew leaflet, the announcement of white smoke from the Sistine Chapel appeared, followed by the announcement that Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost, an American Catholic prelate who had served as prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops and president of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America since 2023, had been elected Pope and has taken the name Leo XIV. This collect on the Election of a new Pope is from the Roman Missal.

O God, who in your providential design  
willed that your Church be built  
upon blessed Peter, whom you set over the other Apostles,  
look with favour, we pray, on Leo XIV our Pope

and grant that he, whom you have made Peter's successor,  
may be for your people a visible source and foundation
