New Beginnings

As I write this, my first cover piece as Rector of Abingdon-on-Thames, I want to start by thanking all those who contributed to the service at which I was inducted and installed in the role and all those who attended the service. It was wonderful to have so many there to support me as I step into this new role.

As part of the service, the new Rector reads out the notices (which strikes me as a very Anglican thing to do!), and although I gave only notices for services and activities happening in the 7 days following the service, it was still a fairly long list. <u>PAULINE BURREN RIP</u> Pauline Burren, a long-time member of St Nicolas' congregation died on Wednesday 14 October. She and her husband, John, moved to a nursing home in Worcestershire to be nearer to family. John died in July 2024.

Pauline served on the St Nicolas' DCC, the Parochial Church Council and Deanery Synod. Readers may remember that Pauline organised a number of the "St Nicolas' Day" lunches at Coseners House. Some readers may remember the "Ladies Lunches" that Pauline organised, shared meals with a wide variety of guest speakers. She was also the driving force behind the Abingdon Craft Fair. She also had other key roles in the Abingdon Civic Society – The Friends of Abingdon. This quotation is from the Summer 2015 of the Friends of Abingdon Newsletter. Pauline and John both stood down from the Council of the Society in June 2015.

Pauline Burren first became involved with the Friends in 1980 when she started to run Craft Fairs for us. She continued to do this for nearly 30 years, bringing in a total of over £300,000 for our funds. As if this wasn't enough, she also took on the roles of Membership Secretary and Events organizer – her outings and social events were always popular. Three years ago she introduced the concept of an annual "Founders Lunch" in May so it was fitting that this year's [2015] was the last event she organized for us.

May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

Worship

<u>October</u> The celebrants and preachers for the next few weeks are: 26 October, The Revd Dr Jennifer Brown; 2 November, The Revd Rosalind Rutherford; 9 November, Canon Ruth Pyke, 16 November, Fr AKMA.

Tuesday is the festival of Simon and James Apostles. There are two commemorations during the week: Wednesday, James Hannington, bishop, martyr, 1885, and Friday: Martin Luther, reformer, 1546. All Saints' Day (1 November) will be kept in the parish, as in many churches nowadays, on Sunday 2 November.

The State Visit of King Charles III to The Vatican A State Visit to the Vatican by King Charles and Queen Camilla had been planned for April as part of their State Visit to Italy. In the event the health of the late Pope Francis meant this had to be cancelled though the King and Queen did pay a private visit to Pope Francis. As readers will know from the press the State Visit has been re-arranged for Thursday 23 October. Although this visit will have taken place before Sunday 26 October, it was in the future when this piece was written on Monday 20 October.

The visit will focus on two key themes: Christian Unity and care for the environment. The programme will include an ecumenical service in the Sistine Chapel at midday (Italian time) . 2025 marks the 10th anniversary of *Laudato Si'*, the encyclical of Pope Francis, subtitled "on care for our common home". The Archbishop of York will also participate in the service. The choirs of St George's Chapel Windsor and His Majesty's Chapel Royal will join the choir of the Sistine Chapel in providing music for the service. At the time of writing an order of service does not appear to have been published, but from Vatican press releases it seems that this service will include a hymn by St Ambrose of Milan in English translation by St John Henry Newman. The King attended the canonisation of Newman in 2019 and at a Mass on 1 November (All Saints' Day) this year, Pope Leo will officially declare Newman a Doctor of the Church. Including Newman, the title Doctor of the Church has been conferred on 34 men and 4 women, the first being Gregory the Great (d. 604) and the second, Ambrose of Milan (d. 397). Newman is only the second English-born Doctor of the Church, the first being the Venerable Bede who was declared Doctor of the Church in 1899.

Newman translated a number of hymns attributed to St Ambrose of Milan and it isn't clear which one will be sung in the service. I think the first one below seems appropriate to the theme, or maybe the second, but, as the saying goes, other options are available.

O God the Lord of place and time, Who orderest all things prudently, Brightening with beams the opening prime, And burning in the midday sky:

Quench thou the fires of hate and strife, The wasting fever of the heart; From perils guard our feeble life, And to our souls thy peace impart.

Or maybe:

Come, Holy Ghost, Who ever One Art with the Father and the Son; Come, Holy Ghost, our souls possess With Thy full flood of holiness.

From the website of the Catholic Bishops Conference of England and Wales, "A 'Doctor of the Church' is a man or woman of great holiness and learning whose teaching and wisdom not only resonated with their own contemporaries, but still illuminates, instructs and inspires today." As a modern translation of an Office Hymn from the Common of Doctors, composed by Ambrose, puts it:

Masters of learning were your eager servants, Stars of great splendour with but one ambition, Deeper to ponder teaching that might show us Life ever blessed. All tongues should praise you, Jesus. Lord and Master, Who lavish treasures through your Holy Spirt, By words and writings of the Church's Doctors, Flame ever fruitful.

In the afternoon there will be a series of private meetings with representatives of the churches, organisations, and businesses, about the environment. Afterwards the King and Queen will travel to the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, which maintains historical ties with the British Crown and its adjacent Benedictine Abbey. The Abbey's coat of arms includes the insignia of the Order of the Garter. To mark the occasion, King Charles will be formally named *Royal Confrater of Saint Paul* by Cardinal James Michael Harvey and Abbot Donato Ogliari, with the approval of Pope Leo XIV. A Vatican Press release attributed this comment to Archbishop Pace, Secretary of the Dicastery [Vatican department] for Promoting Christian Unity, "It is a sign of honour and spiritual communion." According to a BBC News update on Thursday morning, just before this pew leaflet was published, King will make Pope Leo a Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath
