We welcome the Fr AKMA to celebrate and preach at Mass today

There are four possibilities this Sunday: our Dedication Festival, the Conversion of Paul, the 3rd Sunday of Epiphany and the last Sunday of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. At St Michael's we are keeping the anniversary of the dedication and consecration of the church in 1867. St Helen's and St Nicolas' churches are keeping the Conversion of Paul. Fr AKMA writes below about St Paul and there is a little bit about the Dedication Festival in the Worship section.

Did St Paul convert from Judaism to Christianity (as the name of today's feast day suggests), or did he make a different sort of change in his life? The three versions of the Damascus Road story in the Book of Acts (in chapters 9, 22, and 26) certainly suggest a dramatic change in direction, but if we read the New Testament carefully, many details imply that his new faith didn't abandon his former life in Judaism, but that he perceived a twist which nonetheless remained true (from his point of view) to the broad stream of Israel's religion.

When people assail our Jewish neighbours with accusations based in conspiracy theories and bigotry, we should keep in mind that although Paul changed his mind about whether Gentiles might be admitted to the people of God, he never repudiated the Torah ('the Law is holy, and the commandment is holy and just and good'; Rom 7:12), nor the people of Israel ('They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the Law, the worship, and the promises; to them belong the patriarchs, and from them, according to the flesh, comes the Anointed One, who is over all, God blessed forever'; Rom 9:4f). Israel is God's firstborn; we are adopted into God's family. Israel is the trunk and the roots; we have been grafted into the branches.

As we have observed the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we do well to work also for reconciliation among Christians and Jews. We have a long history with many shameful chapters for which we need to repent, to seek to make things right — to show the world our gratitude for God's grace shown to us in Christ Jesus.

'The Hardest Bridge', Tuesday 3 February, 7.30pm – 10.00 pm, in the Auditorium, **St John's College, Oxford**.

As a Volunteer with the Irish Republican Army, Pat Magee planted a bomb in the Grand Hotel, Brighton, during the Conservative Party Annual Conference in 1984, aiming to kill PM Margaret Thatcher. The explosion killed five people including Sir Anthony Berry MP, father of Jo Berry. Magee was arrested in 1985 and imprisoned in 1986 but released under the Good Friday Agreement in 1999. Jo went to meet him. Ever since they have been on a transformative journey which has taken them to situations of tension and conflict in many countries. Can the wounds of war heal? Can enemies reconcile?

'The Hardest Bridge' (45 mins) focuses those questions through the insights of Pat Magee and Jo Berry. They will be present in person to speak and answer questions after the film. Also present will be the film's director, Dr Imad Karam, an award-winning British-Palestinian film maker, and executive producer Howard Grace. Followed by a drinks reception.

Worship

January/February Celebrants and preachers are: 25 January (Dedication Festival), Fr AKMA and then (assuming there are no changes to a draft rota) 1 February, The Revd Dr Jennifer Brown, 8 February, Fr AKMA, 15 and 22 February, The Revd Dr Jennifer Brown.

Commemorations this week include: Monday: Timothy and Titus, companions of Paul, Wednesday: Thomas Aquinas, priest, philosopher, teacher of the faith, 1274; Friday: Charles, king and martyr, 1649; Saturday, John Bosco, priest, founder of the Salesian Teaching Order, 1888.

Ash Wednesday falls on 18 February. There is no Mass at St Michael's that day, but there will be a celebration of Holy Communion with Imposition of Ashes at St Helen's Church at 10.30 am and a Parish Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes also at St Helen's Church at 7.30 pm.

Dedication Festival On Friday 25 January 1867, Bishop Samuel Wilberforce, the Lord Bishop of the diocese, dedicated and consecrated this church building to the glory of Almighty God. It was originally built for those workers who had settled in the town in brewing and tanning, on a plot of land purchased from Christ's Hospital. Common Worship provides sets of readings according to the three-year cycle for Dedication Festivals and other liturgical elements including invitation to confession, collect, intercessions, peace, extended preface to the eucharistic prayer and blessing. All these elements will be used in our Mass today. Where the date of the Dedication is known, the festival is usually kept on the day, and where the date is not known, it may be kept on the first Sunday in October or the Last Sunday after Trinity.

There was an interesting period in the early days of St Michael's Church when St Helen's Church closed for repairs to the walls and roof from June 1871 to July 1873, which were described as being in a state of "extreme dilapidation". Services were transferred to St Michael's. The collect for the day, which was a new composition for the *Alternative Services Book* (1980) is:

Almighty God,
to whose glory we celebrate the dedication of this house of prayer:
we praise you for the many blessings
you have given to those who worship you here:
and we pray that all who seek you in this place may find you,
and being filled with the Holy Spirit,
may become a living temple acceptable to you;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, ... Amen.

This collect reminds us of the central role of our building as a house of prayer, a place where prayer and worship have been offered over since 1867. It reminds of those who have worshipped in this place and have gone before us. It reminds us of our duty to the present generation seeking God in our church and of our duty as custodians of this house of prayer, and of the living tradition of the church, for generations to come. It reminds us that it is a place where hard questions may be asked and hints to answers may be found. By no means least it reminds us of the importance of thanksgiving in prayer.

The Extended Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer is:

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy,
always and everywhere to give you thanks,
almighty and eternal Father,
enthroned upon the praises of your people.
We thank you for this house of prayer,
in which you bless your family
as we come to you in pilgrimage.
Here you reveal your presence in sacramental signs
and make us one with you through the unseen bond of grace.
Here you build your temple of living stones
and bring the Church to its full stature
as the body of Christ throughout the world,
to reach its perfection at last
in the heavenly city of Jerusalem,
which is the vision of your peace.
Therefore, in union with the heavenly Jerusalem,
with angels in joyful assembly,
with all whose names are written in heaven
and with the spirits of the righteous made perfect,
we lift up our voices to join in the triumphal song of praise:
