The Temptation of Jesus

Today's gospel passage, Matthew 4.1-11 follows on from Matthew's account of the Baptism of Jesus and describes how Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. The period of temptation was 40 days during which time Jesus fasted. The temptations including being offered loaves of bread, and all the kingdoms of the world in exchange for worshipping the devil. Jesus's reply was robust: 'Away with you Satan!', 'Worship the Lord your God and serve only him.' The devil departed, angels came to wait upon Jesus and in Matthew's account, Jesus's ministry in Galilee followed.

There are echoes of a range of Old Testament passages in Matthew's account, for example, Exodus 24.18, Moses entered the cloud and went up to the mountain where he stayed for 40 days and nights, and Deuteronomy 8.3 'one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord.' One view of this passage is that Matthew has taken the very brief account in Mark's gospel (1.12-13) and expanded it into a meditation weaving together a series of Old Testament texts and themes.

The first reading, Genesis 2.15-17, 3.1-7, carries the sub-title in the NRSV bible, The First Sin and its Punishment; the serpent tricks the woman and she and her husband ate the forbidden fruit, the fruit of the tree in the garden.

The second reading, Romans 5.12-19, compares Adam and Christ: 'Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification for all. For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience the many will be made righteous ...' (v18).

The prayer after communion for the 1st Sunday of Lent links together the eucharistic bread and the temptation in the wilderness, echoing the rebuke Jesus gave to Satan who challenged him to turn stones into bread (vv2-4):

Lord God, you have renewed us with the living bread from heaven; by it you nourish our faith, increase our hope, and strengthen our love: teach us always to hunger for him who is the true and living bread, and enable us to live by every word that proceeds from out of your mouth; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Abingdon Foodbank At present the foodbank is currently asking for noodles, UHT milk, fruit juice, tinned fruit, squash, corned beef, meatballs, sweetcorn and cooking oil. Deodorants for men and women also needed as are carrier bags. In December 2025, Abingdon Foodbank distributed 272 standard emergency food parcels to people facing hardship in Abingdon and the surrounding villages. These parcels fed 731 people, of which 272 were children. The 2025 Christmas hamper campaign saw special Christmas parcels distributed to 388 local families. We worked with schools and local agencies to help us identify people in need, and thanks to your wonderful donations we helped feed 1,233 people, of which, 644 were children.

There is a collection point in church and other points are situated in local supermarkets and some other local businesses. Worship

There are two commemorations this week: Monday: Polycarp, bishop of martyr, 155; Friday: George Herbert, priest, poet, 1633. Wednesday, Friday and Saturday are Ember Days.

Ember Days Days of prayer for those to be ordained deacon or priest, have traditionally been observed on the Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays at various points in the year. *The Collect:*

Almighty God, you have entrusted to your Church a share in the ministry of your Son our great high priest: inspire by your Holy Spirit the hearts of many to offer themselves for the ministry of your Church, that strengthened by his power, they may work for the increase of your kingdom and forward the eternal praise of your name; through Jesus Christ ... Amen.

These are days too to pray for theological colleges, their staff and students, and theological educators in general; not least those in these categories in our parish.

Lent When baptisms were conducted mainly at Easter, Lent was a season of preparation by the candidates, or catechumens, a period in which they were taught the basics of the Christian Faith, followed in Easter week by teaching about the eucharist and other sacraments.

St Cyril of Jerusalem is one of the early Church Fathers who delivered a series of lectures during Easter week to the newly baptised, the "Mystagogical Catecheses" (Lectures on the Mysteries), the text of which has survived.

For whatever reason, this put me in mind of the Church of England Catechism (BCP) that readers may have learnt as part of their confirmation classes. Described as "An Instruction to be learned of every person before he be brought to be Confirmed by the Bishop", it takes the form of a series of questions and answers, starting with "What is your name ...", "Who gave you this name ...". A catechism for children first appeared in the Prayer Book of 1549 as part of the Confirmation section. A key feature of the catechism is that it was set in a liturgical context. The questions included the Apostles Creed, Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer, the choice of topics being attributed to Luther. Glossing over a lot of detail, other catechisms followed, expanding this basic structure. The catechism in the Book of Common Prayer 1662 includes a section on the sacraments, for example, and the rubrics required that "The Curate of every Parish shall diligently upon Sundays and Holy-days, after the second Lesson at Evening Prayer, openly in the Church instruct and examine so many Children of his Parish sent unto him, as he shall think convenient, in some part of this Catechism." One special feature of the BCP Catechism is that it is set in the context of the liturgy, a reminder that the Catechism isn't just a set text to be learnt but the starting point for a relationship with God that evolves and develops throughout life.

Jumping ahead, in the 1970s, the Roman Catholic Church introduced the *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults*, a four-stage process starting with an initial exploration of Christian faith; the catechumenate, a period of study of teaching, prayer and Christian life; an intense period of preparation (during Lent), preceding baptism at the Easter Vigil; and a final post-baptism reflection on the sacraments. A *Catechism of the Catholic Church* was published in 1994; a much longer document. There are examples too in the Orthodox tradition.

The Church of England Catechism was revised in 1982 by General Synod, and a set of headings was introduced: *The Call of God, the Christian Answer; Christian Belief, The Church and Ministry, Christian Obedience, The Holy Spirit in the Church, The Christian Hope*. This is available on-line.

Bishop Steven wrote an interesting article in 2017 entitled *A very short history of catechesis*, see <https://blogs.oxford.anglican.org/short-history-catechesis/> written to mark the publication of *The Pilgrim Way*, "a contemporary summary of the essentials of Christian Faith for enquirers." This was the result of work commissioned by the House of Bishops in 2012.

Perhaps Lent is an appropriate time to remind oneself of the basics.

Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

for young people who need mental health support but are unable to access it.
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

Give thanks and pray for the work of Tariro:
for the charity's Trustees that they may govern with wisdom and integrity. For the partner trust, Tariro Youth Project in Zimbabwe
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

for the young children who have recently joined Tariro, for their health and schooling. For the five young people baptized earlier this year.
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

for the 100+ young people who have been supported by Tariro over the last 16 years. For their future employment and stability.
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

for the farming projects (pigs, chickens and vegetables), for the members of the Tariro family now in leadership roles.
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

for all young people in Zimbabwe, living in poverty, orphaned or in abusive homes, without hope for the future.
Lord in mercy, hear our prayer.

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, his mercy endures for ever. (Psalm 136)
