Come Holy Spirit

Happy Birthday! Today is the Feast of Pentecost – the birthday of the Church. We think of this day as marking the start of the Church because it was on the Feast of Pentecost that the disciples received the Holy Spirit and began to preach and teach publicly about Jesus.

The Greek word for ‘spirit’ also means ‘breath’ and the Holy Spirit does breathe life into the Church. Jesus’ disciples had been together as a group long before the Pentecost event – during the three years that they travelled with Jesus and in the days following his resurrection and ascension. But it was only once they received the Holy Spirit that they found their voice and the courage to begin speaking openly about Jesus and what had been accomplished through his death and resurrection. It was only when they had received the Holy Spirit that the church really came to life and began to grow.

The Church still needs the Holy Spirit. The Spirit continues to breathe life into the church and to give us breath to sing God’s praises and to spread the Good News of Jesus. So come, Holy Spirit, fill us with life and ‘our souls inspire’.

The Abingdon Bridge and TARIRO – Hope for Youth in Zimbabwe We received warm letters of thanks from The Abingdon Bridge and TARIRO for the donations sent to them from the fund-raising concert given by Wantage Academy Brass/ Youth Brass/ Caritas Children’s Choir on 9 May.

Fr Nicolas CR wrote on behalf of TARIRO:

“Thank you ever so much. I can’t tell you what a relief it is to get in sizeable donations like yours. I breathe more easily for a while.”

He has sent a digital copy of the new TARIRO brochure: “It is one way I have of saying thank you to your people for their generosity. It does show what lively and happy looking young people we care for” This will be circulated with the digital copy of this week’s pew leaflet and there are some printed copies available in church in a literature holder on the table by the south porch.

TARIRO In a separate mailing to TARIRO supporters, Fr Nicolas records the death at the age of 32 of one of the young people, Chengetai. He trained in pig farming and started the pig project in the Honde Valley. It is customary in the

Shona Christian Culture for the unveiling of a tombstone to take place about a year after a person's death. One of the TARIRO children wrote about the event. The TARIRO family travelled to the Honde Valley.

"At exactly eleven o'clock, prayers began. Father Mutasa gave a short speech before the unveiling. The two youngest members of our family, unveiled the tombstone. It had been built by our older brothers and sisters who had since moved on from Tariro House to begin lives of their own. We later attended Mass at Maronda Mashanu Parish, where the TYP [TARIRO Youth Project] choir was leading the music. The service was electric and joyful. Everyone enjoyed it so much that the priest invited us back to sing at the Sunday morning Mass as well. ... Although the journey was marked by sadness, it strengthened our family bond and gave me a deeper sense of reflection about life, family and loss."

Fr Nicolas concluded the mailing:

"Experiences like this remind us that Tariro is more than a project — it is a family. We are deeply thankful to all our friends and donors whose support makes this possible. Your generosity continues to change lives in Zimbabwe and helps young people build hopeful and secure futures."

Worship

Sunday 31 May is Trinity Sunday and Monday 1 June is the Visit of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Elizabeth (transferred from 31 May). Thursday 4 June is the Day of Thanksgiving for the Institution of the Holy Communion (Corpus Christi).

Commemorations during the week of 31 May include Wednesday: Martyrs of Uganda; Friday: Boniface (Wynfrith), bishop, martyr, 754; Saturday: Ini Kapuria, founder of the Melanesian Brotherhood, 1945.

Ordinary Time resumes on Monday. This week is week 8 in the Daily Eucharistic Lectionary. Week 6 started on 15 February, the Sunday next before Lent, but was then interrupted by Ash Wednesday, Lent and Eastertide. What happened to week 7? Because the dates of Ash Wednesday, Easter Day, Pentecost, are not fixed, more weeks of Ordinary Time are required in some years than others. So rather than renumber each year, there is an overall scheme that goes from week 1 to week 34. Week 1 follows the 1st Sunday of Epiphany and weeks 2, 3 etc are used as needed to the week of Ash Wednesday. Gaps are left for Lent and Eastertide. There is another fixed point which is week 11, tied to the week beginning 12-17 June, reflecting the latest possible date for Pentecost. Weeks between 8 June and Pentecost use DEL weeks 11, 10, ... as required. In 2024, for example, Pentecost was kept on 19 May. The following Monday was DEL week 7, and 17 June week 11. A computer scientist would say the readings are tied to the week numbers (in a 2-year scheme), then there is a lookup table from dates to week numbers which changes each year. Others would express this differently. Logical, complicated, interesting, ... all of these!

Pentecost The liturgy for the feast of Pentecost follows a rather different pattern to our normal order. The Introduction reminds us of the events of Our Lord's Passion and death on the cross, his resurrection and revelation of himself in the breaking of bread and return to his throne before which "every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that this Jesus is the Lord." The Introduction concludes:

And now, with the followers of his own time, we await the coming of the promised Holy Spirit, his gift to his people, through whom we make Christ known to the world.

This is followed by a Reading from the Acts of the Apostles (2.1-13) and the hymn "Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire" The next section is "Prayer for personal renewal". This part of the service starts with presentation of the Oil of Chrism. This oil was blessed by our bishop on Maundy Thursday and was received during our liturgy that evening with the prayer:

Anointed with this fragrant oil, may all who are baptized and confirmed, all who are ordained to the service of God's people, and this community whose house of prayer is dedicated to God's glory fill the world with the sweet fragrance of Christ's gospel and be built up as living stones into a temple filled with the Holy Spirit.

There will be an opportunity for those who so wish to be anointed with this oil. The Gloria and Collect are followed by a gradual hymn and the Gospel reading, John 20.19-23.

The end of Mass is also different incorporating three sections: Blessing of Light (during which the candles that were handed out as we came into church are lit), Commission at the end of which the Paschal Candle which has been lit for all Sunday services since the Easter Vigil is extinguished and Conclusion which takes place around or facing the labyrinth.

These variations are a reminder of the unique character of the feast of Pentecost at the conclusion of Eastertide which is summarised in the Extended Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer:

This day we give you thanks because in fulfilment of your promise you pour out your Spirit upon us, filling us with your gifts, leading us into all truth, and uniting peoples of many tongues in the confession of one faith. Your Spirit gives us grace to call you Father, to proclaim your gospel to all nations and to serve you as a royal priesthood. Therefore we join our voices with angels and archangels, and with all those in whom the Spirit dwells, to proclaim the glory of your name, ...

The Middle East

This prayer for Iran appeared in diocesan e-News, and on the Church of England web site. It has also been reproduced in the March issue of A Candle in the Window. The prayer was written by the Rt Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford. Bishop Guli was born in Iran. Her family left the country in the wake of the Iranian Revolution in 1980, when she was 13 years old, and to date she has been unable to return.

Ever-loving God,
who hears us in our anguish and distress,
and longs for us to be free.
We pray for the people of Iran and the wider Middle East,
at this time of fear and uncertainty.
Be near to those who are anxious;
bring comfort to all who are suffering.
Guide those with the power to make decisions,
and lead them in the ways of wisdom, compassion and moderation:
that people of goodwill would seek harmony and reconciliation.
Join us with our Christian brothers and sisters in all places,
in praying for peace with justice,
through him who is the prince of peace,
Jesus Christ our Lord.

A prayer from the Church of England:

Almighty God, from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed:
kindle, we pray, in the hearts of all, the true love of peace
and guide with your pure and peaceable wisdom

Post Communion (Pentecost)

Faithful God, who fulfilled the promises of Easter by sending us your Holy Spirit and opening to every race and nation the way of life eternal: open our lips by your Spirit, that every tongue may tell of your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Collect (From Monday after Pentecost to Saturday)

O Lord, from whom all good things come: grant to us your humble servants, that by your holy inspiration we may think those things that are good, and by your merciful guiding may perform the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ,

Collect (Trinity Sunday)

Almighty and everlasting God, you have given us your servants grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity and in the power of the divine majesty to worship the Unity: keep us steadfast in this faith, that we may evermore be defended from all adversities; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord ...

Post Communion (Trinity Sunday)

Almighty and eternal God, you have revealed yourself as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and live and reign in the perfect unity of love: hold us firm in this faith, that we may know you in all your ways and evermore rejoice in your eternal glory, who are three Persons yet one God, now and for ever.

Collect (Visit of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Elizabeth)

Mighty God, by whose grace Elizabeth rejoiced with Mary and greeted her as the mother of the Lord: look with favour on your lowly servants that, with Mary, we may magnify your holy name and rejoice to acclaim her Son our Saviour, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Collect (Corpus Christi)

Lord Jesus Christ, we thank you that in this wonderful sacrament you have given us the memorial of your passion: grant us so to reverence the sacred mysteries of your body and blood that we may know within ourselves and show forth in our lives the fruits of your redemption; for you are alive and reign with the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion (Corpus Christi)

All praise to you, our God and Father, for you have fed us with the bread of heaven and quenched our thirst from the true vine: hear our prayer that, being grafted into Christ, we may grow together in unity and feast with him in his kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
